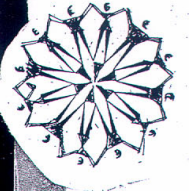

## Sacrament of Reconciliation

Saturday reconciliation is available after 8:30 a.m. Mass, 3:30 to 4:15 p.m., or after the 4:30 p.m. Mass in the Reconciliation Room of the Chapel. Fr. Joel and Fr. Mark are available during the week by appointment. Communal Penance services are held occasionally throughout the year.

Baptisms are usually celebrated two Sundays each month at a 1:45 p.m. service. On selected dates, Baptisms are celebrated at weekend Masses. # Dear Friends,

The celebration of Holy Week and Easter for me this year was galvanizing. Celebrating the mysteries of our salvation and making them our own, certainly does galvanize us and helps us understand what it means to be “bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh,” in the risen Body of Christ.

I am and we are one in the risen Body of Christ. That is what the Easter experience is all about, to have us share the life and power of the resurrection. It is in the relationship we have with Jesus and one another in Christ that we experience the power of the Spirit which raised Jesus from the dead, giving wings and breath to our lives.

That has been the experience of Christians from the beginning, sharing the life of the resurrection received in Baptism when we died and rose with Christ. That is why we hear today of how the first Christians, being of one heart and mind, “not claiming their possessions as their own, but holding everything in common,” experienced great power bearing witness to the resurrection of Jesus in their lives. There was no needy person among them,

property was sold and distributed to each according to need. Talk about radical faith!

It is possible because we are begotten, progeny of God, as St. Paul tells us in the second reading, “for whoever is begotten by God conquers the world. And the victory that conquers the world is our faith.”

Jesus, as we hear in the gospel, gave us the Spirit — the Spirit that raised him from the dead, sending us out on mission as his disciples. “As the Father has sent me, so I send you... He breathed on them and said, ‘Receive the Holy Spirit’.

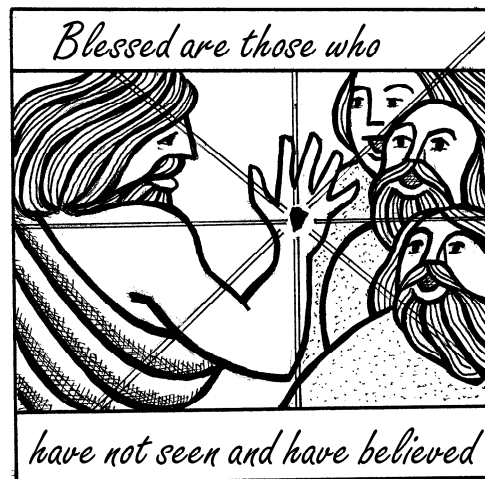
We are called and sent to continue the mission and ministry of Jesus as his disciples. We are stewards of that trust and the gifts of the Holy Spirit we have been given. So today our Bishop calls us to exercise our stewardship of those gifts as mature Christian disciples to enable the mission of the church in our diocese through the annual Diocesan Appeal.

We are not an island. The parish of St. Thomas subsists in the Diocese of Joliet, the diocese enables us and we, with all Catholics of our diocese, enable the diocese. We are like a family, one for all and all for one. Our parish, our ministers, the sacramental life and ministry of St. Thomas hinges on the ministry of our diocese. Support of our diocese is to support our parish and part of our total stewardship commitment. I urge everyone, at whatever level they can, to make some commitment to our Diocesan Annual Appeal. Our quota is based on percentage of those participating, so I ask everyone to do something, otherwise we must take monies from our operating funds to meet our diocesan quota. We are a strong parish with strong faith. I know in the true spirit of the resurrection that you will help to keep our church strong and enable the mission and ministry of Jesus in our diocese and our parish.

## Exult!

At the Easter Vigil last week, all shared the light of the large Easter candle, and the deacon or cantor sang a long prayer. This was the paschal proclamation, called the *Exsultet*, after the first word of the prayer in Latin, meaning “Rejoice!” The prayer dates back to the seventh century. Before that, the deacon was expected to make one up and chant it! The *Exsultet*’s music is the finest chant in the Latin liturgy.

As a prayer of thanks and praise, the *Exsultet* shows us that these are days to truly rejoice in all that God has done, in all that God is doing now. And not only us: The *Exsultet* calls upon all creation to join us in rejoicing: “Rejoice, heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels! Exult, all creation around God’s throne!” Why? “Jesus Christ our King is risen!”

Make your plans now to plant your garden — even if it’s a small flower bed or window box! Pick up litter as you come and go this week. Recycle as much of your garbage as possible. Do what you can to encourage the earth into exultation. Light of Christ! Thanks be to God!

## Second Sunday of Easter

**PEACE** — Throughout the liturgical year we focus on the words, actions, and miracles of Jesus as he moved from town to town. Today we focus especially on the first word of the Risen One as he greeted the disciples on the evening of that first Easter: “Peace.” The first word from the mouth of God’s Son—who had been unfairly tried, who had been beaten and spit upon, whose hands and feet were nailed to a tree, who suffered enormous pain in that torturous death—was the word “Peace.” Not “Revenge!” Not “Retribution!” Not “Kill!” “Peace.”

## INSPIRED BY THE GOSPEL OF PEACE

— After suffering one of the greatest injustices known in history, it would seem that Jesus had every reason to bring down vengeance upon those who had treated him with such unfairness. But instead of vengeance, he spoke of peace. To us this may seem odd. For many of us, almost from the beginning of our lives, we are taught that the response to violence must be revenge. But does this have to be the case?

Many of us remember the day when Pope John Paul II was shot in St. Peter’s Square. Did he seek revenge on the one who shot him? No; when the pope recovered, he visited his would-be assassin in prison, bringing with him the peace that comes through reconciliation. When this occurred, many in the world were stunned by what seemed to be an unbelievable gesture. They were stunned because this is simply not what the world has come to expect. In his gesture of reconciliation, the pope showed himself as an embodiment of the actions of Christ on that first Easter evening. Today is a day to ponder the fact that Jesus Christ sought to exact no revenge for the way he was treated. Instead he inspired in his followers, and inspires within us, a deep commitment to peace.

Children of Haiti and Equator are lucky to get just one meal per day. This one meal lacks all the essential vitamins children need for growth and good health. Thank you to everyone who gave just one bottle of vitamins or several. You made a difference in a child's life.

## Special Instructions for Receiving Communion at the First Eucharist Liturgies

1<sup>st</sup> Eucharist Liturgies will be April 29 at 4:30, April 30 at 9:00 and 12:15 and May 6 at 1:00 and 4:30 and May 7 at 12:15. In addition, there are some children receiving their First Communion at the Misa de Mayo mass on May 27 at 4:30 p.m. During these liturgies the First Communicant and parent/s will be invited to come forward first to the front stations. Other guests in those rows and the rest of the assembly will be asked to wait for Communion until all First Communicants and parents have received. Eucharistic Ministers will proceed to their assigned stations as usual but will remain facing the altar at their assigned station (*except in front*) until all First Communicants and parents have received. At that time, the catechists who are helping and the host-greeters will invite everyone else to Communion. This will include the other guests in the First Communicant's pew. We thank you for your patience as the children and their parent's receive Eucharist and thank you for the prayers you have said for these children as they meet Jesus in this most holy sacrament.

A healthy family/individual is a prepared one. The National Safety Council and the American College of Emergency Physicians has prepared a First-aid kit Checklist for the home. It is a very comprehensive listing, but it is truly an intelligent solution to being prepared in a crisis.

### FIRST-AID KIT CHECKLIST:

- Disposable latex or vinyl (if allergic) medical exam gloves
- Mouth-to-mouth barrier devices for rescue breathing
- List of medications taken by each family member
- Poison control number: 1-800-222-1222
- Emergency contact numbers
- Digital thermometer
- Adhesive bandages (various sizes)
- Various size, sterile dressings and bandages
- Antiseptic wipes (Antibacterial soap and running water is first choice)
- Oral medicine syringe for children (if appropriate)
- Sharp scissors with rounded tips, tweezers, safety pins
- Disposable, instant-activating cold packs (2)
- Antibacterial hand wash
- Saline solution The following should be added if there are no allergies known and if all items are of current dating (routinely, discard and replace outdated items)
- Antibiotic ointment
- Calamine Lotion
- Hydrocortisone cream or ointment
- Aloe Vera gel
- Aspirin/ Ibuprofen/ non-aspirin
- Antihistamine (e.g. Benadryl)
- Cough suppressant

A small fishing tackle box is a great container for the above items, however, any storage container will do. Be Prepared!

# Stewardship Commission

## Give To Specifics

Good stewards dislike – and rightly so – generic appeals. Good stewards also are less generous – and rightly so – if they do not know to what or to whom their generosity is being directed. That is why good stewards give and give generously of themselves and their means to their parish.

And there in the parish, good stewards are eager to hear the stories, the modern-day parables of lives changed, enriched, made better and more human because of their generosity. They understand that good stewardship is not lived by merely dumping their time, talent and treasure into some dark hole, while piously folding their hands, eyes cast heavenward, uttering, “I gave”. That actually would be testimony to poor stewardship. Good stewards, carefully marshaling their gifts, are willing to be generous to their parish, but in turn expect accountability for those gifts they have shared.

But it is more than good bookkeeping. It is about common sense. If the good steward has seen or heard of a parish need and has responded, that steward would logically want to know what role he or she has had in meeting it. Good stewards want to know they helped paint these walls or put on a roof or pay a decent salary to a teacher.

It is not that every hour, expression or talent or dollar must be specifically targeted and then directly attributed to the giver. But there is a real satisfaction, a deserved satisfaction, in knowing that because of their efforts a young mother was provided a safe home for her baby and herself, the youth mission trip went smoothly, the RCIA program is deepening people's faith, or dinners and visits to the widower made an enormous difference after the death of his beloved life's companion.
