C.A.R.E CORNER

Prayer is another thing we can learn about from Jesus. If you plumb the depths of the gospels, you will find Jesus frequently engaging in prayer. Mark 1:35 reports that Jesus got up early, before dawn and went to a deserted place to pray. Sometimes he went up a mountain by himself to pray (Matthew 14:23). Other times, he seemed to just break into spontaneous praise of his Heavenly Father while in the midst of many disciples (Luke 10:21). After the Last Supper, Jesus went to the outdoor garden known as Gethsemane to pray (Mark 14:32). And he prayed in unidentified places while his disciples were looking on. Those disciples then said to him “Lord, teach us to pray ...” (Luke 11:1)

In response, Jesus said “This is how you are to pray: Our Father in heaven ...” (Matthew 6:9) We know the rest of that prayer. Jesus personally prayed to his Father in heaven in John 17. He prayed that his disciples would be kept safe from the evil one and that they would continue his mission of preaching God’s word. He also prayed for all of us who would come to believe in him through the efforts of his disciples. Jesus taught his disciples to first “forgive anyone against whom you have a grievance” (Mark 11:25) before they prayed and to also “pray for those who persecute you” (Matthew 5:44). If we want to learn how to pray and what to pray for, why not go right to the Source?

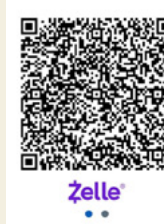

If you feel called to support this mission financially, donations can be made through the QR code. I am departing for Africa June 10.

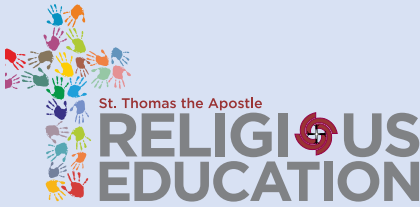

Justice Can Begin on the Deck

The Outreach and Social Justice Office has been accompanying a man who is homeless, unemployed and currently living in his car – which no longer runs. As you might imagine, his world has grown very small. At times he is hungry for food, but even more so, he is starving for connection.

With tears in his eyes, he shared a simple, heartbreaking wish:

“I just wish someone would invite me to sit on their deck.”

We often think of social justice as something that happens in large, public ways – marches, legislation, service projects, organized outreach. These efforts matter deeply. But the Gospel reminds us that transformation also begins in quiet, ordinary moments – in gestures of welcome, in relationships, in seeing one another.

As warmer weather draws us outdoors, many of us will gather on decks and patios – sharing meals, celebrating milestones, enjoying time with family and friends. In these moments, perhaps we are invited to pause and ask:

- Who around me feels unseen or unheard?
- Whose burdens remain hidden?
- Where might I make room for another?

Justice does not always begin with grand action. Sometimes, it begins with an open chair, a simple invitation and the courage to see someone who longs to be known. These moments do not need to be perfect. They simply need to begin. Justice can begin on the deck.

Transitional Housing Mentor Training

The St. Thomas Transitional Housing Ministry would like to expand its ministry to include more families. To do that, we need more trained mentors to join the ministry. The mentor role is both challenging and yet extremely rewarding. Mentoring consists of weekly meetings with the family. A relationship is established, and goals, budgeting and other concerns are discussed.

Bridge Communities provides training for new mentors. The next training session will take place Friday and Saturday, June 5–6, at Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church (41 N. Park Blvd., Glen Ellyn). Friday’s session runs from 5:30–8:30 pm and Saturday’s session takes place from 8:15 am–4:00 pm. Mentor training will cover practical aspects of mentoring, challenges faced by client families and how to collaborate with Bridge Communities to achieve great outcomes.

Stroke Awareness: Know the Signs

What are the signs of stroke in men and women?

- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or lack of coordination.
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- Sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or difficulty understanding speech.
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause.

Call 911 right away if you or someone else has any of these symptoms.

Preventive Measures

- Keep your blood pressure below 140/90 mm Hg (below 130/80 mm Hg if you have diabetes or kidney disease).
- Do not smoke.
- Lose weight if you are overweight (BMI of 25 or higher).
- Eat a healthy diet, rich in fruits and vegetables.
- Reduce saturated fat, cholesterol and salt.
- Be physically active for at least 30 minutes a day.
- Limit your alcohol intake to no more than two drinks a day if you are a man and no more than one drink a day if you are a woman.
- If you've already had a stroke or transient ischemic attack (TIA), ask your doctor about taking an antiplatelet or anticoagulant medication and a statin.
- Ask your doctor whether you should have a carotid endarterectomy, a surgical procedure to remove plaque from those arteries carrying blood to the brain.

Latest Research

Patients experiencing a (TIA) or “ministroke” should call 911 and go immediately to the ER, where they can be treated with tissue-type plasminogen activator (tPA). Administering tPA within 4½ hours or sooner of the TIA increases the patient’s odds of survival and full recovery.
