Dear Parish Family,

Today's gospel, the beginning of Jesus' public ministry in Luke's gospel, is like an inauguration speech which, according to Luke, sets the tone of God's life with us; a speech where Jesus gives hope to the poor, the hungry, those who are mourning, those whom society thinks of as outcasts by referring to them as "blessed." In another translation of

today's gospel, Jesus refers to them as "happy."

Unlike the better life which others try to give those who are suffering now, the rewards which Jesus promises are not rewards which they will see in their lifetime. He's not promising them that they will win the "Lotto," at least not in this life. If anything, according to Jesus, the world will continue to look down on you, they will see you as hopeless cases because they think that you are wasting your time and energy as you continue to be faithful to God when faced with poverty, with hunger, with sorrow.

We are people without hope, without a chance of happiness in the life to come, if we forget that God is with us, if we forget God's promise of life in his kingdom to those who do their best to remain faithful to God.

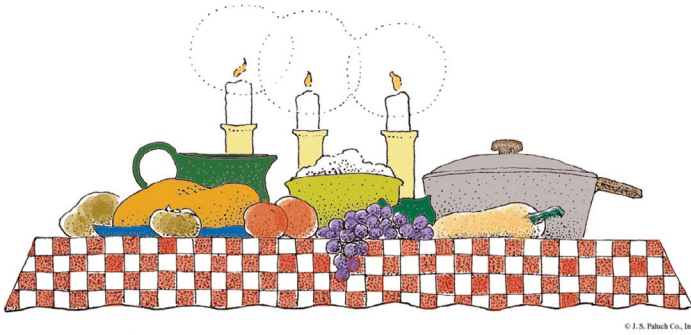

Voices of Faith Choir

College – Adults

This ensemble rehearses on Tuesday evenings and is open to all singers ages high school through adult. The Voices of Faith Choir sings a wide variety of musical styles and helps to lead the musical prayer of the parish at weekend Masses and feast days. A music background is not necessary, but a willingness to learn vocal skills is. We are especially in need of more male voices.

Cantors

High School – Adults

Experienced vocalists who possess musical training and help lead Worship at Masses when the choir is not present. Cantors are chosen by audition only.

Instrumentalists

Adults

Experienced instrumentalists — guitars, drums, strings, reeds, brass. These help minister at all the Masses. We will work around your schedule.

Journey Praise Choir

Grade 6–12

Lead all elements of music ministry for the parish at various Mass times through the year. Singers AND Instrumentalists are welcome — piano, drums, guitar, bass, brass, woodwinds, etc. are all welcome!

Youth Choir

Grades K-5

Learn the basics of music ministry through fun, varying selections of songs and hymns appropriate for young voices. Group helps lead worship about once per month, including special liturgies.

Handbells

High School – Adults

A ministry that is not affected by masks! Play handbells at designated Masses throughout the year. Ability to read music and bell playing experience helpful.

Of such I dream, my world!



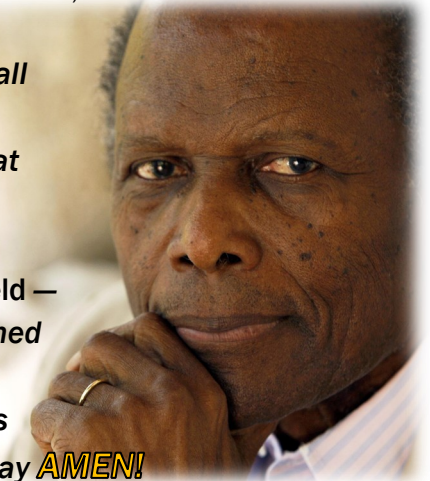
St. Thomas the Apostle Catholic Church has a tradition of celebrating Black History Month throughout the month of February. Our parish mission states that:

“We believe each life is sacred, each person gifted by God. We value diversity in our midst.”

We welcome all people into the Body of Christ. We celebrate all Children of God.

Below find a biography of a Black individual who has made a contribution to our world, overcome obstacles, and provide an example of living out the Gospel mission.

Actor Sidney Poitier — *Born in Miami in 1927, Sidney Poitier grew up in the Bahamas; the youngest of seven children to a family of tomato farmers. His parents sent him back to Miami to live with an older brother when he was a teenager. Not having encountered racism in the Bahamas, he ‘mistakenly’ delivered goods to the front door of a white woman’s house—only to be told by her to go to the back door, and have the KKK sent to his house that evening. Looking for better opportunities, Poitier moved to New York City. He worked the simple, laborious jobs available to Blacks at the time, later finding an advertisement for the American Negro Theater. After a couple failed auditions, Poitier worked on softening his West Indian accent and improving his English reading ability. Landing a place in the theater’s acting school, Poitier began acting in small roles, while continuing to work menial jobs. Climbing the ladder of the entertainment industry was difficult, as Poitier refused to accept roles that played to racial stereotypes. He worked to push the restrictive racial boundaries set by Hollywood. Poitier received his first Academy Award nomination in 1958, and finally won an Oscar in 1963 for Lilies in the Field — being the first African-American to win the award. Poitier’s career flourished for the next forty years as an actor and director. He died in 2022. Sidney Poitier was very purposeful in ensuring that the art he created was respectful to all life—in whatever form or color it takes — and to that we say **AMEN!***



Lively music ministry is a way that St. Thomas the Apostle parish engages in worship. One of the diverse styles heard during the liturgy throughout Black History Month is the Spiritual.

A spiritual is a type of religious folksong that is most closely associated with the enslavement of African people in the American South. Spirituals began as an oral tradition passed from one slave generation to the next. Often rooted in biblical stories, which were memorized then translated into song, spirituals described the extreme hardships endured by African Americans who were enslaved. Music, religion, and everyday life are inseparable in the spirituals, and through them, religious ideals were infused into the activities of everyday life. Spirituals also encompass the work songs and plantation songs that evolved into the blues and gospel songs in church.

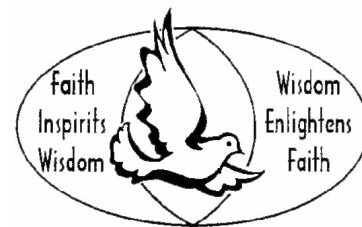

C.A.R.E. CORNER

The life of our next saint moves us just into the third century of the common era. St. Irenaeus was born near Smyrna in Asia Minor. As a youth he heard the preaching of St. Polycarp and was so taken, that he decided to follow in his footsteps. Eventually he became the Bishop of Lyons in France, where he served for 20 years. The gnostic heresy, which denied the central Christian claims of creation, Incarnation, Eucharist and Trinity, was pervasive at that time. In response, Irenaeus wrote his great defense called *Against The Heresies*, which is still a classic in Christian apologetics. In the text, he showed how the true faith could be traced in a direct line to the 12 apostles, who were the original witnesses of the Resurrection. Gnosticism could not claim the same authority.



In both speech and in writing, Irenaeus railed against those gnostics who “set aside the truth,” who dabbled in “cleverly crafted speculation,” who “overthrow the faith of many, luring them away, under a pretense of superior knowledge,” as if “they had something more excellent and sublime to reveal than God.” And don't we deal with this same issue of lying words today? Irenaeus was another pivotal early Christian leader who preserved orthodox doctrine and handed down the faith of the apostles. His early writings also provided testimony to the canonicity of the four Gospels and to the primacy of the See of Peter. Irenaeus died in the year 202.

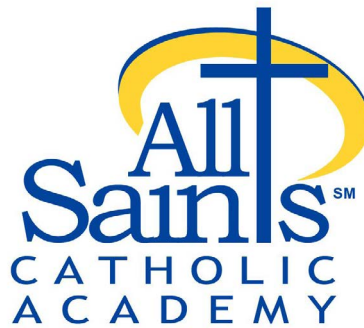

Parish Twinning Program Theresa Patterson Retires

In 1998, Sr. Marlene, the Outreach and Social Justice Director, traveled to Haiti with three other women. Their idea was to find a women's group in Haiti that they might in some way be able to assist. During that trip, they stayed at the Visitation Guest House in Port-au-Prince, operated by the Parish Twinning Program. There they met Theresa Patterson, the founder of the Haiti Twinning Program.

As Sr. Marlene talked about her objectives and about St. Thomas' potential to assist, Theresa saw a bigger vision for what St. Thomas might be able to accomplish . . . and she had a new Haitian parish that she felt would benefit from a twinning relationship. As they say, the rest is history, as we celebrate 22 years of twinning with Ste. Marie-Madeleine Parish in Duchity, Haiti.

Recently, Theresa Patterson announced her impending retirement from the Parish Twinning Program (PTP). Below are excerpts from the retirement announcement.

Since its founding in 1978, PTP has been a story of Patterson's love and commitment, bringing hope and aid to thousands of people in Haiti and Latin America. PTP under Theresa's leadership has been facilitating and maintaining parish linkages throughout the United States for the past 44 years. PTP has grown to become the largest, most significant organization of its kind. More than 300 U.S. parishes have been twinned with parishes in Haiti and Latin America, providing more than \$50 million in aid to impoverished Catholic communities.

"Theresa is a living example of what one person of great faith can do to make a real difference in the world. She is the spark that has ignited the hearts of thousands of missionaries who bring hope to the poor in Haiti and Latin America. Her quiet and gentle style masks the awesome power of her spirit and great leadership," said Diane Huggins, president of PTP Board of Directors.

Even more impressive than the \$50 million in aid are the countless relationships that were built and continue between the Haitian parish communities and the U.S. parish communities. That is what "twinning" is all about.

Theresa said, "It has been a most humbling and rewarding gift to have spent so many years in nurturing and growing the work of the Program. Haiti will always be my passion and in my heart."

We congratulate Theresa on her retirement and thank her for all her good work . . . and we thank her for her making the match between St. Thomas and Ste. Marie-Madeleine!

He is currently the Manager of Program Evaluation at Mercy Home for Boys and Girls in Chicago.

New 3-Digit National Suicide Phone Hotline Federal Officials Look to Smooth Transition

People in crisis and those trying to help them will have a new phone number — 988 — to reach the national suicide prevention network starting in July. Federal health officials recently announced more than \$280 million to smooth the transition from the current 10-digit number to a three-digit number. The new number will also handle text and chat.

"We know that remembering a three-digit beats a 10-digit number any day, particularly in times of crisis, and I encourage every state to rev up planning to implement 988 for the sake of saving lives," Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra said in a statement.

Mental health experts are hoping that the three-digit number will deliver a breakthrough in assisting people in crisis who may otherwise try to harm themselves.

People who call, text or chat 988 will be able to reach trained counselors who belong to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network. Counselors at more than 180 local centers listen to people in crisis and provide support, connecting them with other services that may be needed. According to the Lifeline, the new dialing code will be available throughout the country starting July 16. The network currently relies on a 10-digit number, 800.273 TALK (8255), to route calls to crisis centers.

Of the \$282 million recently announced, \$177 million will go to bolster and expand the existing crisis network's operations and telephone infrastructure, including centralized chat and text response, back up capacity and a sub-network for Spanish-speakers. The rest of the money will go to build up staffing at local call centers.

Suicide had been the 10th leading cause of death in the U.S., claiming more than 47,000 lives in 2019, but dropped to 11th in 2020, mainly due to the coronavirus pandemic, which killed at least 345,000 Americans and became the nation's No. 3 killer.

Suicide attempts result in more than 300,000 people seen in hospital emergency departments for self-harm injuries. Rates of suicide rose steadily over much of the last 20 years, and it remains a leading cause of premature death for people from their teens well into their 50s.

From the Office of the Parish Nurse Five Hours of Weekly Exercise Linked to Fewer Cancer Cases

If you need another reason to get moving this winter, consider this: a study published online October 4, 2021, by the journal *Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise* suggests that the United States might avoid tens of thousands of cancer cases each year if we all start exercising more.



Researchers evaluated the self-reported physical activity of more than half a million U.S. adults as well as adult cancer cases in every state and the District of Columbia from 2013 to 2016. Scientists estimated that about 3 percent of cancer cases per year (about 46,000) could be attributed to inactivity — defined as getting less than 300 minutes of exercise per week. Rates of cancers of the stomach, uterus, colon, esophagus, breast and bladder were all lower among more physically active people, particularly those who did at least 300 minutes of moderate intensity activity, such as brisk walking. That works out to about 43 minutes per day. Because this is an observational study, it doesn't prove that increasing your physical activity will reduce your risk of cancer. But there is strong evidence that this level of activity also is associated with a lower risk of heart disease, stroke, diabetes, dementia — and possibly many common types of cancer.

Drinking Both Coffee and Tea Linked to Lower Risks for Stroke and Dementia

Are you a coffee drinker or are you more of a tea person? Consider being both. A study published November 16, 2021, in *PLoS Medicine* found that having both coffee and tea in the diet was associated with a reduced risk of dementia and stroke.

Researchers evaluated the health and self-reported coffee and tea drinking habits of more than 365,000 older adults in the United Kingdom who were followed for 11 years. Compared with people who did not drink any tea or coffee, people who drank two to three cups of coffee as well as two to three cups of tea per day had a 28 percent lower risk of dementia and a 32 percent lower risk of stroke during the study period. The combination of both drinks in the diet appeared to have a stronger association than just having one or the other.

The study is only observational and doesn't prove that drinking coffee and tea prevents stroke or dementia. But we know that the beverages both contain polyphenols . . . plant chemicals that may help fight chronic inflammation. Chronic inflammation is associated with both dementia and cardiovascular disease.

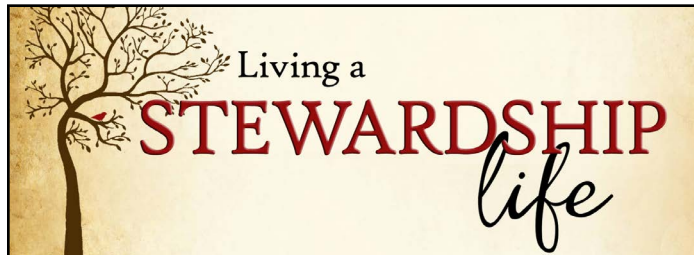
