Dear Parish Family,

I once heard a radio personality say that he couldn't go to confession because he had too many sins to confess. I guess I must have missed that class when they discussed time limits to confessions. I also heard a priest mention how people are reluctant to go to confession because they don't think that God will forgive their sins. The priest responds with

"How dare you tell God that He won't forgive your sins!"

Not only is there no such thing as a time limit as far as confessing one's sins is concerned, there is no such thing as an unforgivable sin, something which Jesus taught the Jewish leaders who brought to Him a woman caught in the act of adultery. Instead of agreeing with them that she should be immediately executed, Jesus immediately forgave her.

There's an interesting sidelight to today's gospel. When the leaders asked Jesus if the woman should be executed, He "bent down and began to write on the ground with His finger." The Son of God was doodling. One legend which I've heard is that He was writing down the sins of the woman's accusers, that as they saw what He was writing, they began to leave one by one because they were embarrassed.

While that might be a legend, we all know how embarrassed we are when we've done something wrong.

Embarrassing? Yes. Unforgivable? As far as God is concerned, absolutely not!

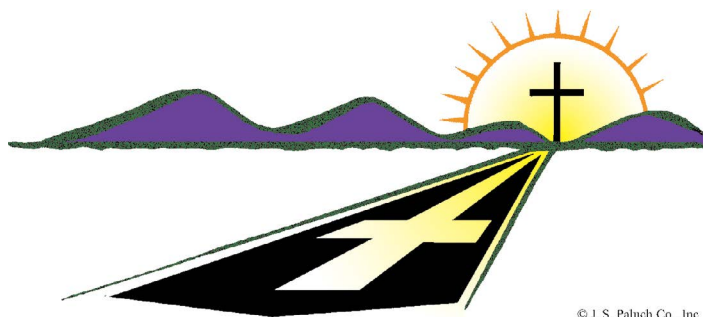

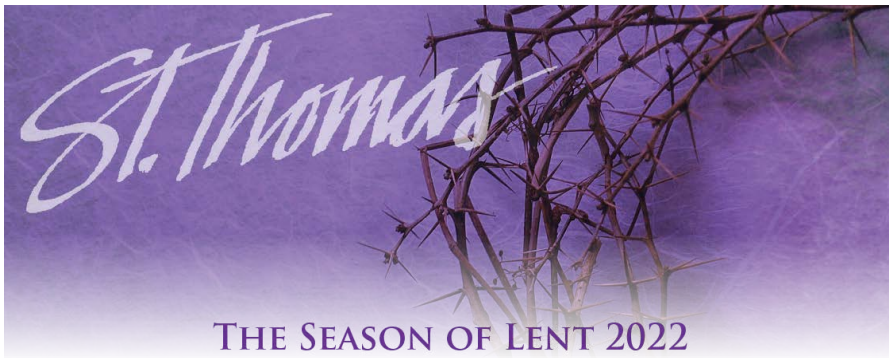

Stations of the Cross

Fridays of Lent

7:00 pm | Church

The Way of the Cross has always been a powerful and popular part of the faith tradition and devotional life for Catholics throughout the ages. The early practice of Christians attempting to retrace and walk the path of Jesus has been a treasured way to commemorate the Passion and Death of Christ.

This year, St. Thomas the Apostle is adding Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament to the Stations of the Cross. Beginning worship with the Exposition of the Eucharist, Stations of the Cross will provide prayer for the period of Eucharistic Adoration. The evening will close with Benediction.

April 8

The *Scriptural Stations of the Cross* are based on those celebrated by Saint Pope John Paul II on Good Friday in 1991. They are an alternative to the traditional stations as a way of more deeply reflecting on the Scriptural accounts of Christ's Passion. Prayerful silence accompanies the transition between stations.

Holy Week Taizé

Taizé prayer, a style of prayer used by the ecumenical religious community from Taizé, France, is characterized by a calming, meditative atmosphere, simple sung refrains, scripture readings, ritual action, and vocal and silent prayer. 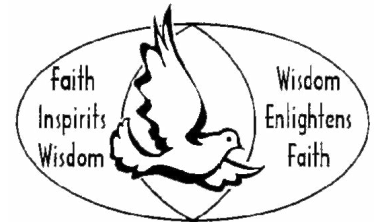

C.A.R.E. CORNER

St. Ephrem the Syrian was born in Nisibis, Turkey around the year 306. He founded a theological school and taught there. But when the Persians took rule of his city, they began to persecute the Christians who started to leave. Many settled in Edessa. There Ephrem took to living in a cave and focusing his time on writing. He was a celebrity of sorts in his time. He was known as a theologian, a poet, a writer on Scripture and a song writer. He wrote many hymns on the Trinity, the Incarnation and Mary.

To combat heresies, Ephrem taught Christian doctrine by composing poems and setting them to music. A women's choir sang them in public worship. This is one of the earliest witnesses we have to the use of hymns in public worship. When the plague spread, he cared for the sick and distributed grain to the poor during a famine. Ephrem contracted the plague and died in 373. In the East, he is known as the "Harp of the Holy Spirit." He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1920. From the example of St. Ephrem, we see how we too can use our own special talents for the benefit of the Church, especially musical talents, to not only worship, but also to teach.

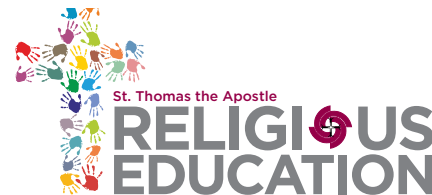

Service Commission — Outreach and Social Justice

Tell your legislators Statewide Source of Income Protection

From 2014-2016, the St. Thomas Housing Alliance Ministry advocated for an amendment to the Naperville Fair Housing Ordinance that would specifically identify Housing Choice Vouchers as a “legal source of income,” thus requiring landlords to accept applications from voucher families. Landlords had been discriminating against voucher families by refusing to accept vouchers as a source of income. St. Thomas parishioners signed over 500 letters to the Naperville City Council in favor of the amendment, which then passed on a 5-4 vote.

Naperville was one of the first Illinois communities to pass a “voucher as a legal source of income” ordinance. Now Hope Fair Housing is advocating for a similar law at the state level.

Advocacy Opportunity!

If HB 2775 is signed into law, it will allow people with disabilities, veterans, seniors and Housing Choice Voucher-holders to no longer be turned away from housing because of how they pay their rent. HB 2775 will open the doors to stable housing for many Illinois residents who would otherwise not have options.

Middle School Faith Formation and the OSJ Office recently partnered to introduce advocacy to the youth as a way to put their faith into action, as we are all called to do. The problem, possible solutions, and the potential impact of advocacy were outlined.

The Problem

In the United States, according to the US Department of Agriculture, more than 38 million people, including 12 million children are “food insecure”. Fifteen percent of the children in our country are food insecure!

Advocacy Opportunity

The youth were presented with the opportunity to sign a letter to our Senators, urging them to strengthen the nutrition programs that give our nation’s children the opportunity to flourish. The letter was reviewed with the youth. They were asked to consider signing the letter, only if they were in agreement with what the letter said. Seventy-eight letters were signed.

The letter had a space for the youth to add their personal comment. Below are a number of the comments:

- At school, I had to do some research on hunger and how it can affect our health. I found out that hunger can affect our bodies and minds and we wouldn’t be able to concentrate on our work and we would be at risk of having more health problems. So, I think that helping these children would really help our country too!
- First, I would like to say thank you for all your support in health! And support in the past! But kids all around the globe just like me need you now more than ever!
- I would like them to feel safe just like me, and to grow to be whom they dream to be. Thank you!

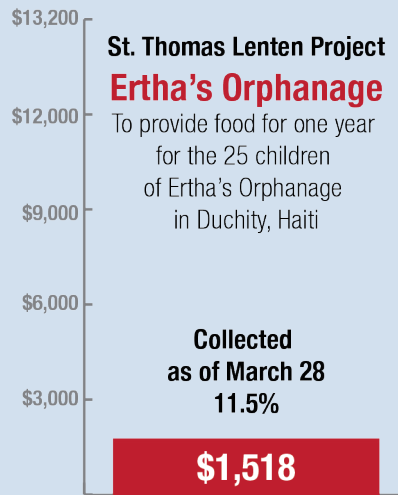

From the Behavioral Health Ministry April is National Minority Mental Health Month

April is National Minority Health Month (NMHM), a time to raise awareness about health disparities that continue to affect racial and ethnic minority populations and encourage action through health education, early detection and control of disease complications.

Health disparities are differences in disease burden, disability and mortality in a defined population. Populations affected by disparities include racial and ethnic minorities, people who live in diverse geographic locations, women, children, older people and people with disabilities.

6 Facts About Mental Health and Minority Groups:

- 1. Immigrant Experiences:** The challenges these groups face set them apart from the challenges encountered by native-born Americans.
- 2. Access to Physicians:** Research from the US Government shows that many groups have few opportunities to receive proper physical or mental care.
- 3. Being Medicated:** Many minority groups aren't receiving the mental health treatment they need.
- 4. Suicide:** There's nothing more tragic about mental health than suicide, which is far too often the end result of acute depression and anxiety. But not many people realize that it affects each ethnic group differently and is most prevalent among minorities.
- 5. Teen Mental Health:** Among people age 18 to 24 nationwide, the suicide rate is 12.8 deaths per 100,000, and is the second leading cause of death for people between 15- and 24-years-old, the CDC reported. Among all racial and ethnic groups studied, men at this age were far more likely than women to commit suicide.
- 6. Raising Awareness is Key:** Bebe Moore Campbell National Minority Mental Health Awareness Month. This was established in 2008 to recognize the work of Bebe Moore Campbell, a pioneer in researching mental health issues among minority groups. She was co-founder of the National Alliance on Mental Illness Urban Los Angeles, which continues to examine the prevention and treatment of mental health issues in the LA community.

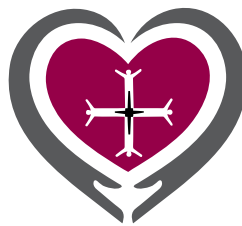

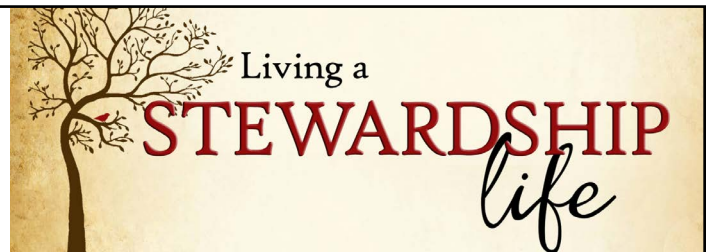

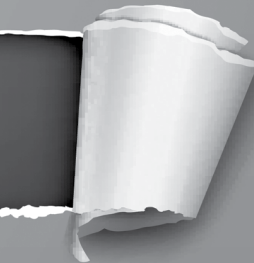
