

Letter from the Bishop



Dear Friends,

On the weekend of April 23-24, our diocese will take up a second collection for the Catholic Home Missions Appeal.

Home mission dioceses are those dioceses in the United States and its territories that need outside help to provide basic pastoral services, such as the Mass, the sacraments, religious education and ministry training for priests, deacons, religious sisters and laypeople. These dioceses often face fragile

financial situations, vast distances or difficult terrain. Nearly 40 percent of the dioceses in the United States and its territories are considered home missions.

We are one Catholic Church. What happens to one of us, affects us all. As Pope Francis notes in Fratelli Tutti, "we need to develop the awareness that nowadays we are either all saved together or no one is saved." (Paragraph 137).

Let us remember our brothers and sisters in Christ in home mission dioceses so they may share fully in our Catholic faith.



C.A.R.E. CORNER

On this Easter Sunday, our current pontiff, Pope Francis, leads our universal Church in the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. As we continue our series on saints, it's fitting to focus on some great saints who served as popes. The two we're going to highlight were given the moniker "the Great"

as they were considered to be standouts among all the popes. The first such pope was Leo, who was elected to the papacy in the year 440. Leo was born in Rome and became a teacher, preacher and writer on doctrinal matters. He left us many letters and homilies that helped strengthen the faithful. He also took care of the sick and the poor and was known for his many works of mercy toward his flock in Rome. Heresies were raging throughout the Church during Leo's papacy. But Leo stood firm and clear in the teachings of

the Church. As pope, he convened the Council of Chalcedon in the year 451, which declared that Jesus was one person with two distinct natures — one divine and one human. The Council Fathers exclaimed "Peter has spoken through the mouth of Leo."

Leo was also quite the diplomat during an especially trying time in the history of our Church. When the Roman Empire was taking its last breaths and had no army to speak of, Leo left the city limits of Rome and went out to meet with Attila and the Huns. The year was 452 and somehow Leo convinced Attila not to sack the city. The Vandals followed the Huns in 455 and once again Leo's diplomacy helped avert the burning and final destruction of the city. Leo the Great died in 461 and is buried near the tomb of St. Peter. As we might expect, he also carries the title of Doctor of the Church.





First Eucharist Liturgies- Communion Procedures

First Eucharist Masses are on the following dates:

- Saturday, April 23 at 4:30 pm Mass
- Sunday, April 24 at 9:30 am Mass
- Sunday, April 24 at 11:15 am Mass
- Saturday, April 30 at 4:30 pm Mass
- Sunday, May 1 at 9:30 am Mass
- Sunday, May 1 at 11:15 am Mass

During these liturgies the First Communicants and parents are invited to come forward first to the front stations. Other guests in those rows and the rest of the assembly will wait to receive communion, allowing all First Communicants and their parents to receive the Eucharist first. Eucharistic ministers will proceed to their assigned stations as usual but will remain facing the altar at their assigned stations until all First Communicants and parents have received. May Peace Prevail on Earth New Peace Pole Signs

Pray for Peace

In light of recent events in Ukraine, two temporary signs have been placed next to the Peace Pole, one on either side. "May Peace Prevail on Earth" is written in the Russian language on one sign and in the Ukrainian language on the other. As you leave church on Easter Sunday, or any time, consider stopping by the Peace Pole to say a prayer for peace in Ukraine, throughout the world and in our hearts.

The Peace Pole on the St. Thomas grounds is located outside the doors to the Gathering Area. The pole was dedicated on Sunday, September 17, 2017. Peace Poles are one of the most recognized international peace symbols and monuments around the world. Over 250,000 poles have been "planted" in almost



every country. The Peace Pole Project was introduced to the United States in 1986. Peace Poles symbolize the oneness of humanity and the common wish for a world at peace. They remind us to think, speak and act in the spirit of peace and harmony and to stand as a silent visual for peace to prevail on earth.

The St. Thomas Peace Pole, initiated by the Pax Christi ministry, is a six-sided stainless steel pole, about eight feet tall once the pole is in the ground. The words "May Peace Prevail on Earth" is cut into the pole in six languages: Arabic, English, Hebrew, Haitian Creole for St. Thomas' twinning parish in Duchity, Haiti, Lakota for St. Thomas' twinning parish on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota, and Spanish for St. Thomas' twinning parish in Aurora, Illinois.



You are more likely to encounter someone – friend, family member or neighbor – in an emotional crisis than someone having a heart attack. Just as CPR teaches you how to respond to someone in a medical crisis, MHFA prepares participants to assist someone experiencing a mental health crisis. You will learn situational skills to intervene and help someone experiencing a mental health problem.

You will learn:

- Signs and symptoms of mental illness
- Risk and safety assessment
- Intervention strategies

From the Office of the Parish Nurse **How to Take Your Pulse**

Your pulse is your heart rate, or the number of times your heart beats in one minute. You can take your pulse using the radial artery in your wrist or the carotid artery in your neck.



Some medical conditions can be a factor in determining the best place for you to take your

pulse. For example, if you have heart disease or longstanding diabetes, it's best to use the artery on your wrist.

General instructions for taking your pulse

To get an accurate pulse:

- Take your pulse the same time each day.
- Sit down and rest several minutes before taking your pulse.
- Count your pulse for a full 60 seconds unless told otherwise by your health care provider.

Taking your radial pulse

- 1. With your palm up, look at the area between your wrist bone and the tendon on the thumb side of your wrist. Your radial pulse can be taken on either wrist.
- 2. Use the tip of the index and third fingers of your other hand to feel the pulse in the radial artery between your wrist bone and the tendon on the thumb side of your wrist.
- 3. Apply just enough pressure so you can feel each beat. Do not push too hard or you will obstruct the blood flow.
- 4. Watch the second hand on your watch or a clock as you count how many times you feel your pulse.
- 5. Record your pulse rate and inform your primary physician if necessary.

Taking your carotid pulse

- 1. Find the area on one side of your neck near your windpipe. Your carotid pulse can be taken on either side of your neck.
- 2. Put the tip of your index and long finger in the groove of your neck along your windpipe to feel the pulse in your carotid artery. Do not press on the carotid artery on both sides of your neck at the same time. This may cause you to feel lightheaded or dizzy, or possibly faint.
- 3. Apply just enough pressure so you can feel each beat. Do not push too hard or you will obstruct the blood flow.
- 4. Watch the second hand on your watch or a clock as you count how many times your feel your pulse rate.
- 5. Record your pulse rate and inform your primary physician if necessary.


