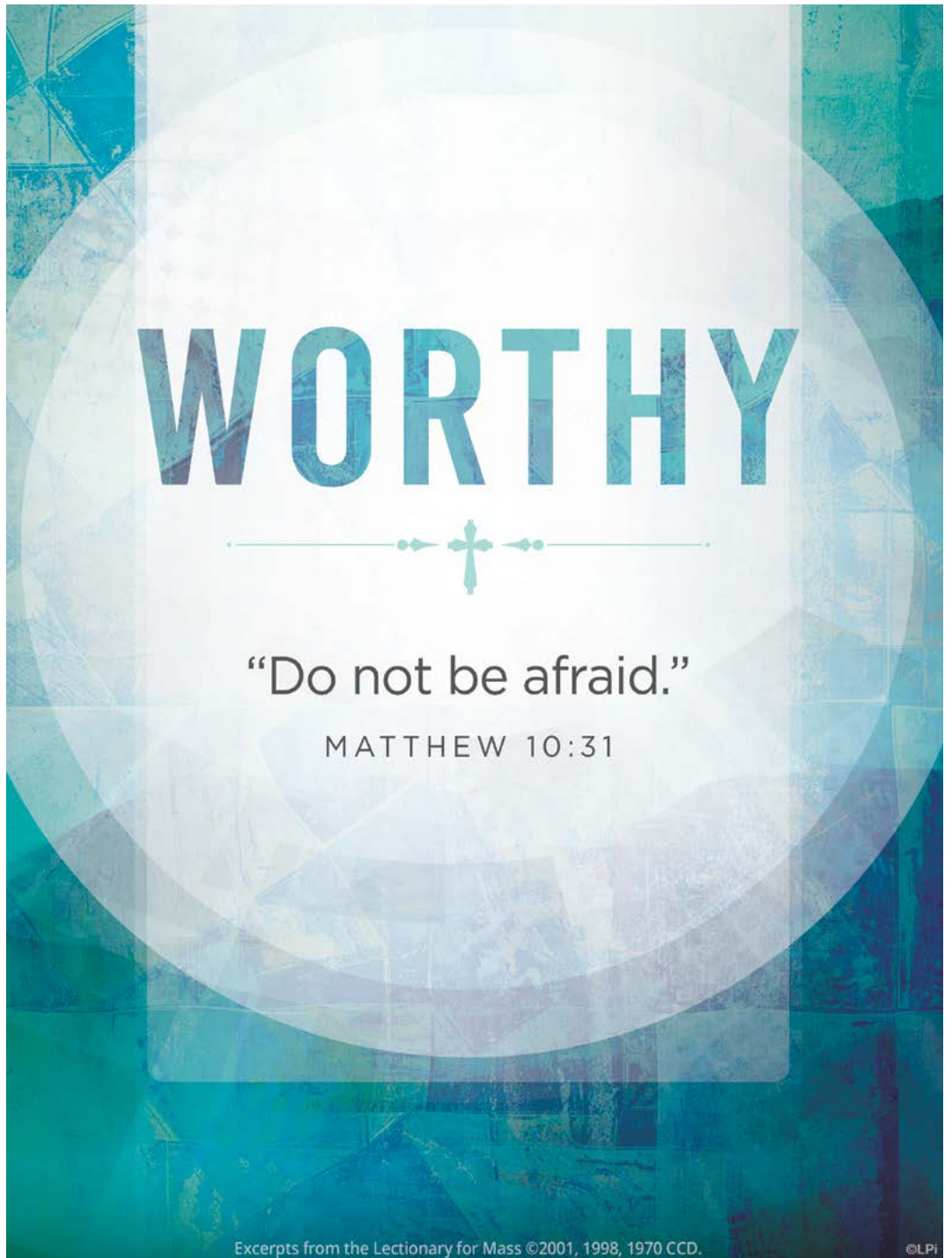

What Is a Soul, if Not ...?

The Gospel of Matthew warns that the greater danger is not about those who may kill the body, but rather it is about those who can destroy both body and soul. Indeed, what if our soul dies long before our body dies? What then has become of our living?

Henry David Thoreau spent a year at Walden Pond in 1845. He did not go to escape life, he said, but to preserve it, to live it more fully. "I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not when I came to die, discover that I had not lived," he wrote in *Walden* in 1854. "I did not wish to live what was not life, living is so dear, nor did I wish to practice resignation, unless it was quite necessary. I wanted to live deep and suck out all the marrow of life, to live so sturdily and Spartan-like as to put to rout all that was not life."

To have a soul is not as if some other-worldly reality has been given a home in our body. Rather, to have a soul is to have a source of hope even in the face of failure, to love in imitation of Jesus even when we are not loved, to see goodness even when it is hidden, to trust in God even when we are powerless. It is the source of mystery, of all that is transcendent, the home of all that is holy.

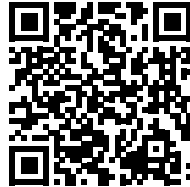

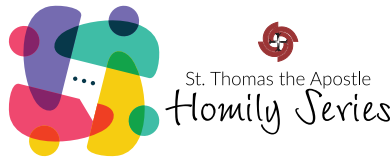

C.A.R.E CORNER

This column is continuing its series on the Jewish roots of our Catholic faith. We've already introduced the basics of worship, altars and the concept of sacrifice. But let's get into more detail. Like so many other cultures, the Jews would set aside a special space for worship and



sacrifice in order to acknowledge the holiness of that space. The People of the Exodus made monetary and material contributions to a common pot in order to build a sanctuary so they could have a space for God to dwell within their midst. Exodus 26 gives us the parameters of, as well as the materials they used to build their sacred space. At that time, the sanctuary was a mobile structure, like a tent, which they could tear down and put up as they wandered through the desert following God's lead.

By definition, a "sanctuary" is a holy or sacred space. For the Jews, that space evolved into one, primary permanent space – their Temple – especially the one built by Solomon in Jerusalem as a house for the Lord (1 Kings 6). For the Jews, this was the place where God lived. If you wanted to visit God or spend time in God's Presence, you paid a visit to the Temple. For us Catholics, our church building could be likened to a temple in the sense that we see it as God's house. Within our larger church structure, we have the primary holy space of the sanctuary, which is where we conduct our worship services.

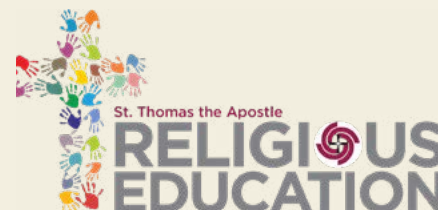

Feast of Corpus Christi

We celebrated the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ – more widely known as the Feast of Corpus Christi – on June 11, 2023. It was also the start of Year 2 of The National Eucharistic Revival. At the 9:30 am Mass, Fr. Peter spoke about how Eucharist truly is the body and blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ the Son of God. His homily is available on the St. Thomas website under the "Explore" tab.

Despite the damp, chilly weather, the spirit of approximately 150 faithful attending our Eucharistic Procession after the 9:30 am Mass was warm and far from dampened. Some of our First Communicants as well as the Knights of Columbus, St. Thomas Music Makers and many faithful parishioners processed in front of church, around the grounds and then back to the Chapel for Adoration and Benediction.

The National Eucharistic Revival is a multi-year movement introduced by the USCCB to restore understanding and devotion to the Eucharist here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ.

This first year of the Revival invited diocesan staff, bishops and priests to respond to the Lord's personal invitation and equipped them to share this love with the faithful through Eucharistic congresses and other events.

This year, the second phase will foster Eucharistic devotion at the parish level, strengthening our liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, missions, resources, preaching and organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

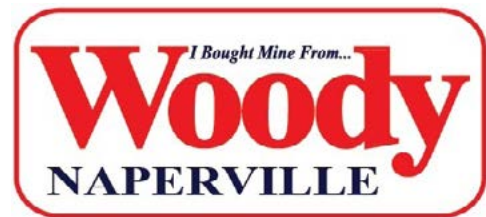

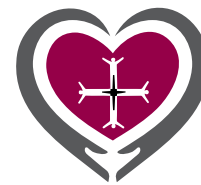

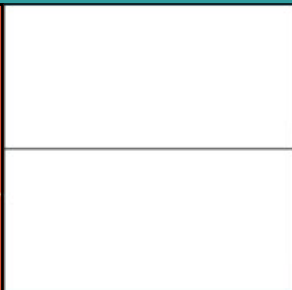
