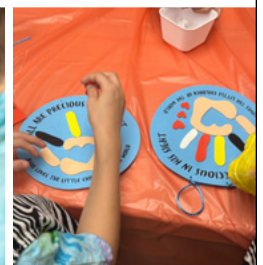

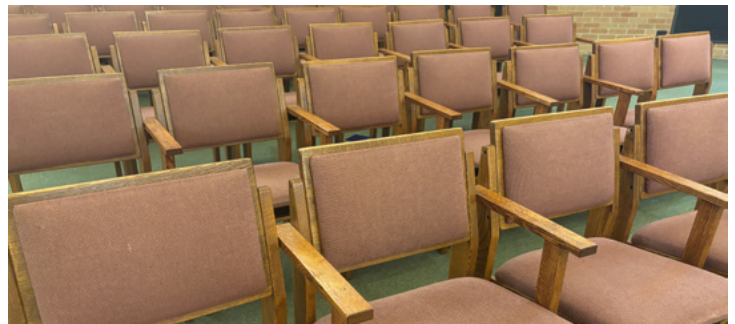

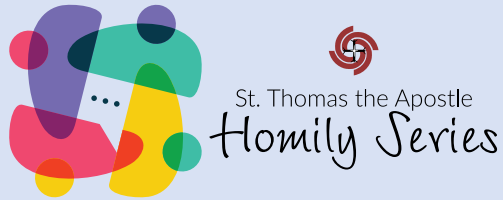

## C.A.R.E CORNER

The disciples often referred to Jesus by the title of Rabbi. A rabbi was a teacher. And Jesus certainly did a lot of teaching – apparently with authority – according to Mark 1:22. Matthew’s gospel (28:19-20) wraps up with these words from Jesus to his disciples: “Go, therefore,



and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you ...” Jesus’ commission to his closest followers was to invite more followers, to bring them into his church through baptism and then to teach them how to be disciples.

Our Church gets a lot of flack for being “political” and raising her voice in public affairs, trying to impress the generous and compassionate mind and heart of Christ into the minds and hearts of people around the world. But that’s what Jesus did and that’s what he said we are to do. He said he came to call sinners (Mark 2:17), so that is what we’re supposed to do. He called out the faults of those who sinned, so that’s what we’re supposed to do (Matt 18:15 +). He also forgave sin, and that’s another thing we’re supposed to teach and model to a very unforgiving world.

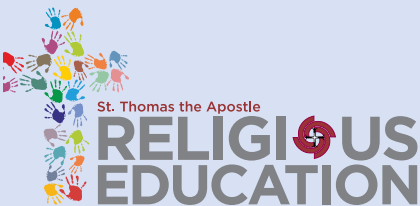

## Fathers Who Carry More Than Their Own Dreams

On Father's Day, we give thanks for the fathers, grandfathers, stepfathers, godfathers and father figures who guide, protect and sacrifice for their families. This year, we also remember immigrant and refugee fathers – men who often carry extraordinary burdens in silence.

Many fathers leave behind everything familiar so their children might live in safety, attend school freely or simply sleep without fear. Some flee violence, war, political persecution or crushing poverty. Others work multiple jobs in a new country while learning a new language and culture, all while trying to preserve the dignity and traditions of home.

The risks they take are enormous: Yet many continue because of love – the same love that has always defined fatherhood at its best: the willingness to sacrifice oneself for one's children.

This Father's Day, may we pray for all fathers who carry heavy responsibilities – especially those who crossed borders, oceans or deserts so their children might have hope.

## Funding a Dream

Earlier this month, a woman reached out to the OSJ office with a request that was about more than paying a fee – it was about reclaiming a path forward. Over the years, St. Thomas Cares has walked alongside her and her family, offering assistance at critical moments so she could continue caring for those who depend on her. She shared that her current job, paying \$16.00 an hour, was simply not enough to support her family. But she also shared a dream: she had once worked as a hair stylist and believed that returning to that career could open the door to greater stability. To take that step, she needed to have her professional license reinstated. She had tried to save a little from each paycheck, but with everyday expenses pressing in, it felt out of reach. St. Thomas Cares was able to help by paying the license fee.

We cannot know exactly where this opportunity will lead, but we do know what it made possible in that moment: dignity, encouragement and the chance to pursue a better future. She was excited. She was grateful. And perhaps most importantly, she left with renewed hope – not only that her circumstances could change, but that she was not alone in trying to change them.

Because of your generosity, St. Thomas Cares can do more than meet immediate needs. Together, we can help remove obstacles, restore possibility and offer hope when it is needed most. Thank you for making moments like this possible.

## Pope Leo XIV, His New Encyclical, and Catholic Social Teaching

Catholic Social Teaching is the body of Church teaching that applies the Gospel and the teachings of Jesus to social, economic and political life. It emphasizes the dignity of every human person and calls Catholics to work for justice, peace, care for creation and the common good, especially on behalf of those who are poor or marginalized.

Pope Leo's first encyclical, *Magnifica Humanitas* ("Magnificent Humanity"), is a major development in Catholic Social Teaching because it applies the Church's long-standing social principles to the age of artificial intelligence and digital technology. Just as Pope Leo XIII addressed the Industrial Revolution and workers' rights, Pope Leo XIV is addressing the 'digital revolution' of AI, algorithms, surveillance and automation. .

## St. Vincent de Paul Ministry Helping Families Remain in Their Homes

The St. Vincent de Paul Ministry at St. Thomas responds to calls from local families seeking rent and utility assistance. While national news often speaks broadly about the economy, St. Vincent de Paul volunteers see firsthand what those challenges mean for families right here in Naperville. During the month of May, the ministry received 30 phone calls and was able to provide support to 15 families. In total, \$7,116.68 in assistance was provided, with most of those funds helping families remain current on apartment rent.

Each family assisted by the ministry met with St. Vincent de Paul volunteers and had the opportunity to share part of their story. As this important ministry continues, additional help is needed. 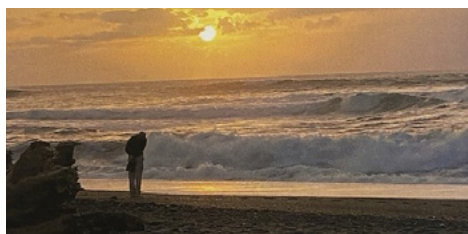

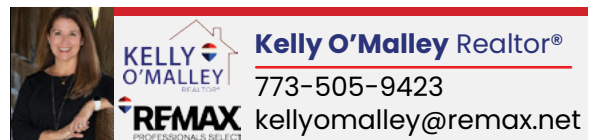
